### SUMMER SCIENCE

### FOR UPCOMING 6<sup>TH</sup>, 7<sup>TH</sup> AND 8<sup>TH</sup> GRADE STUDENTS

### PROCEDURE:

- 1. All work must be written in a bound composition style notebook with student's name on the front cover.
- 2. All work must be dated and timed.
- 3. All work must be written in pen.
- 4. Student must write down 5 <u>original</u> project ideas in the journal. Include a brief description of the idea and the source of the idea (how you came up with this idea).
- 5. The notebook will be turned in the first day of school, and the student should be prepared to discuss their ideas in class.
- 6. The notebook (with 5 original ideas) is a test grade.
- 7. USE OF INTERNET PROJECT LISTS AS A SOURCE OF IDEAS IS NOT ACCEPTABLE.

A powerful, luminous story of coming of age at the end of the 1950s, it is the story of a mother's love and a father's fears, of growing up and getting out.
